Employing EEA and non-EEA nationals in Belgium: What do I need to consider? What could be applicable to British citizens post-Brexit?

The rules to employ EEA nationals vs non-EEA nationals in Belgium are substantially different. The formalities for self-employed persons in Belgium vary also depending whether or not you are an EEA national. Although it is yet too early to know if Brexit would imply more immigration restrictions for UK nationals, during this session our panel of experts will address the issues to consider when employing EEA nationals and non-EEA nationals in Belgium.

- ⌘ **Who needs a professional card and/or a work permit?**
- ⌘ **Which authorities are competent?**
- ⌘ **Which conditions must be complied with?**
- ⌘ **How long does it take?**
- ⌘ **Applicable social security, taxes, employment rules and other formalities when seconding foreign employees to Belgium.**
